National Police Federation

Council welcomed a virtual delegation from the [National Police Federation](#). The NFP is [advocating against the establishment of a provincial police force](#) in Alberta. The Town of Rocky Mountain House has already expressed its opposition to a provincial police force in a letter to Minister of Justice Kaycee Madu, and thanked the NFP for its presentation.

Feeding of wildlife

Council discussed the merits of a wildlife attractant bylaw versus a wildlife feeding bylaw. In April, Council heard from Fish and Wildlife Officer Conor Noyes about the risks of human-wildlife conflict in Town. Council will consider a bylaw to prohibit the intentional feeding of wildlife at its June 8 meeting.

Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw

Council discussed the merits of updating the Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw to eliminate cats as a registered pet in Town. This was considered as a means to reduce the annual expense of controlling feral and at large cats. Council asked administration to consult with the Rocky Organization for Animal Rescue (ROAR) and
