# **Clearwater Regional Fire Rescue Services 2021 budget**

Council accepted the 2021 operating budget for Clearwater Regional Fire Rescue Services (CRFRS), in accordance with the CRFRS Agreement. The Town's share of the \$2,709,530 operating budget for 2021 will be \$588,115, which is 23.25 per cent of the total operating budget. Council also accepted the CRFRS 2021 capital budget of \$743,100, of which \$102,900 will be the Town's

Council <u>reviewed the Clearwater Regional Emergency Management Agency agreement</u>, which expires in February 2021. The agreement does not meet the current provincial legislative requirements; Council will not renew the current agreement but will propose mutual aid agreements to Clearwater County and neighbouring First Nation communities to maintain regional cooperation on Emergency preparedness.

Council also discussed <u>Central Alberta Economic Partnership</u> (CAEP). The Town will not renew its membership at this time.
