

Highlights from the July 20, 2021 Regular Council meetings

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Delegation: Rocky Chamber

Council welcomed Michelle Meatheringham and Colleen Dwyer from the Rocky Chamber to share an [update on its activities and service to members](#) over the past year. The Town of Rocky Mountain House will join [David Thompson Mobile App](#) this summer.

Delegation: Rocky Pump Track community

Council welcomed Rachel and Jeremy McAdam, who shared a community vision for a [pump park and mountain bike skills park](#) in Rocky Mountain House. Council asked Administration to work with the community group to identify possible locations for such a facility as a first step.

Municipal Emergency Management

Council approved the [Town of Rocky Mountain House Evacuation and Re-Entry Plan](#). The plan outlines responsibilities and procedures involved in a possible evacuation of all or part of the Town, as well as re-entry guidelines. It is a supplement to the Municipal Emergency Plan already in place.

Council also made minor revisions to the [Emergency Management Bylaw](#), to ensure it aligns with provincial legislation.
